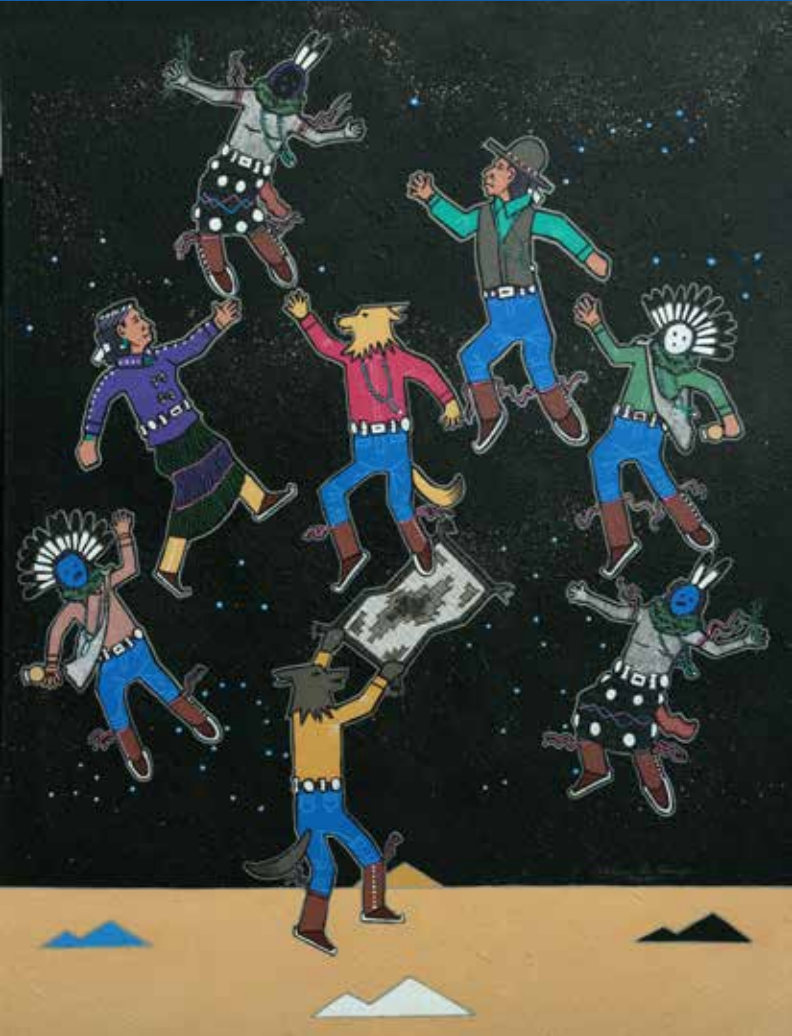


# Sustainable Wisdom
